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IMPRISONMENT

The defendant is hereby committed to the custody of the Federal Bureau of Prisons to be imprisoned for a total term of: **ONE HUNDRED AND TWENTY (120) MONTHS** as to each of Counts 1 through 8, to be served **CONCURRENTLY**, for a total term of imprisonment of **ONE HUNDRED AND TWENTY (120) MONTHS**.

The Court recommends to the Bureau of Prisons that the defendant be designated to a facility as close as possible to South Florida. The Court further recommends that the defendant be allowed to participate while incarcerated in the residential drug abuse program (RDAP).

The defendant is remanded to the custody of the United States Marshal.

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SUPERVISED RELEASE

Upon release from imprisonment, you will be on supervised release for a term of: THREE (3) YEARS as to each of Counts 1 through 8, to be served CONCURRENTLY, for a total term of supervision of THREE (3) YEARS.

MANDATORY CONDITIONS

- 1. You must not commit another federal, state or local crime.
- 2. You must not unlawfully possess a controlled substance.
- 3. You must refrain from any unlawful use of a controlled substance. You must submit to one drug test within 15 days of release from imprisonment and at least two periodic drug tests thereafter, as determined by the court.
- 4. You must make restitution in accordance with 18 U.S.C. §§ 3663 and 3663A or any other statute authorizing a sentence of restitution. Restitution payments must be made to Clerk, U.S. District Court, Northern District of Georgia, 2211 U.S. Courthouse, 75 Ted Turner Dr. SW, Atlanta, GA 30303.
- 5. You must cooperate in the collection of DNA as directed by the probation officer.

You must comply with the standard conditions that have been adopted by this court as well as with any other conditions on the attached page.

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STANDARD CONDITIONS OF SUPERVISION

As part of your supervised release, you must comply with the following standard conditions of supervision. These conditions are imposed because they establish the basic expectations for your behavior while on supervision and identify the minimum tools needed by probation officers to keep informed, report to the court about, and bring about improvements in your conduct and condition.

- 1. You must report to the probation office in the federal judicial district where you are authorized to reside within 72 hours of your release from imprisonment, unless the probation officer instructs you to report to a different probation office or within a different time frame.
- 2. After initially reporting to the probation office, you will receive instructions from the court or the probation officer about how and when you must report to the probation officer, and you must report to the probation officer as instructed.
- 3. You must not knowingly leave the federal judicial district where you are authorized to reside without first getting permission from the court or the probation officer.
- 4. You must answer truthfully the questions asked by your probation officer.
- 5. You must live at a place approved by the probation officer. If you plan to change where you live or anything about your living arrangements (such as the people you live with), you must notify the probation officer at least 10 days before the change. If notifying the probation officer in advance is not possible due to unanticipated circumstances, you must notify the probation officer within 72 hours of becoming aware of a change or expected change.
- 6. You must allow the probation officer to visit you at any time at your home or elsewhere, and you must permit the probation officer to take any items prohibited by the conditions of your supervision that he or she observes in plain view.
- 7. You must work full time (at least 30 hours per week) at a lawful type of employment, unless the probation officer excuses you from doing so. If you do not have full-time employment you must try to find full-time employment, unless the probation officer excuses you from doing so. If you plan to change where you work or anything about your work (such as your position or your job responsibilities), you must notify the probation officer at least 10 days before the change. If notifying the probation officer at least 10 days in advance is not possible due to unanticipated circumstances, you must notify the probation officer within 72 hours of becoming aware of a change or expected change.
- 8. You must not communicate or interact with someone you know is engaged in criminal activity. If you know someone has been convicted of a felony, you must not knowingly communicate or interact with that person without first getting the permission of the probation officer.
- 9. If you are arrested or questioned by a law enforcement officer, you must notify the probation officer within 72 hours.
- 10. You must not own, possess, or have access to a firearm, ammunition, destructive device, or dangerous weapon (i.e., anything that was designed, or was modified for, the specific purpose of causing bodily injury or death to another person such as nunchakus or tasers).
- 11. You must not act or make any agreement with a law enforcement agency to act as a confidential human source or informant without first getting the permission of the court.
- 12. If the probation officer determines that you pose a risk to another person (including an organization), the probation officer may require you to notify the person about the risk and you must comply with that instruction. The probation officer may contact the person and confirm that you have notified the person about the risk.
- 13. You must follow the instructions of the probation officer related to the conditions of supervision.

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SPECIAL CONDITIONS OF SUPERVISION

As part of your supervised release, you must comply with the following special conditions of supervision.

You must pay any ordered financial penalties in accordance with the Schedule of Payments sheet of the Judgment. Payment of criminal monetary penalties is due during the period of imprisonment. All criminal monetary penalties, except those payments made through the Federal Bureau of Prisons' Inmate Financial Responsibility Program, are to be made payable to the Clerk, U.S. District Court, 2211 U.S. Courthouse, 75 Ted Turner Drive, SW, Atlanta, GA 30303. Any balance that remains unpaid at the commencement of the term of supervision shall commence within 60 days after release from imprisonment on the following terms: payable at a rate of no less than \$250 monthly plus 25% of gross income in excess of \$2,500 per month to U.S. District Court Clerk. You must notify the Court of any changes in economic circumstances that might affect the ability to pay this financial penalty.

You must make full and complete disclosure of your finances and submit to an audit of your financial documents at the request of your probation officer. You must provide the probation officer with full and complete access to any requested financial information and authorize the release of any financial information. The probation office may share the financial information with the United States Attorney's Office.

You must not incur new credit charges, or open additional lines of credit without the approval of the probation officer.

You must participate in a mental health treatment program and follow the rules and regulations of that program. Such program may require that you submit to an evaluation and / or testing. The probation officer, in consultation with the treatment provider, will supervise your participation in the program (provider, location, modality, duration, intensity, etc.). The Court waives all costs.

You must take all mental health medication prescribed by your treating provider. You must pay for all or part of the costs of medication based on your ability to pay unless excused by the probation officer.

You must submit your person, property, house, residence, vehicle, papers, computers (as defined in 18 U.S.C. § 1030(e)(1)), other electronic communications or data storage devices or media, or office, to a search conducted by a United States Probation Officer. Failure to submit to a search may be grounds for revocation of release. You must warn any other occupants that the premises may be subject to searches pursuant to this condition. An officer may conduct a search pursuant to this condition only when reasonable suspicion exists that you violated a condition of your supervision with regard to any type of fraud offense and that areas to be searched contain evidence of this violation. Any search must be conducted at a reasonable time and in a reasonable manner.

You must permit confiscation and/or disposal of any material considered to be contraband or any other item which may be deemed to have evidentiary value of violations of supervision.

You must participate in an alcohol and / or other substance abuse treatment program and follow the rules and regulations of that program. The probation officer will supervise your participation in the program (provider, location, modality, duration, intensity, etc.). The Court waives all costs.

You must submit to substance abuse testing to determine if you have used a prohibited substance. You must not obstruct, attempt to obstruct, or tamper with any testing methods. The Court waives all costs.

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CRIMINAL MONETARY PENALTIES

Payment of criminal monetary penalties is due during the period of imprisonment. All criminal monetary penalties, except those payments made through the Federal Bureau of Prisons' Inmate Financial Responsibility Program, are to be made payable to the Clerk, U.S. District Court, 2211 U.S. Courthouse, 75 Ted Turner Drive, SW, Atlanta, GA 30303. Any balance that remains unpaid at the commencement of the term of supervision shall commence within 60 days after release from imprisonment on the following terms: payable at a rate of no less than \$250 monthly plus 25% of gross income in excess of \$2,500 per month to U.S. District Court Clerk. You must notify the Court of any changes in economic circumstances that might affect the ability to pay this financial penalty.

Special Assessment

\$800.00. The special assessment shall be paid to the United States immediately.

<u>Fine</u>

The Court waives the fine and cost of incarceration.

Restitution

You are ordered to make restitution in the amount of \$2,611,745. Funds will be distributed by the Clerk to the victims in the amounts listed on the attached restitution chart.

The restitution shall be paid in full immediately.

The Court determines that you do not have the ability to pay interest and it is ordered that the interest requirement is waived for restitution.
